SUMMIT WORKSHOPS

'APP'LY STEM Education: This session will consist mostly of interactive group work. It will attempt to awaken the **ENGINEER** in everyone. The participants will also explore every day applications of STEM careers. Participants will be challenged to be more than consumers and become innovators in order to begin to shape their futures beyond high school.

Dress for Success: "Face, Fashion, Finances": This session will focus on preparing and pruning young ladies for their future now in the area of dressing for success. The class will focus on face, fashion and finances which are essential to the successful development of young girls into their transition of womanhood. The young ladies (9th-12th grade) will be equipped with tools for enhancing their facial beauty in a modest manner, they will examine articles of clothing for different settings, participate in a discussion of etiquette techniques and they will be educated on how to finance their fashion frugally.

Dress for Success: 'APP'earance 101: What do I want someone to remember about me? How can I create the right first impression? How do I want to be perceived? The previous series of questions are questions that **should resonate** in the minds of successful 21st century students. This workshop is designed to educate, empower and equip both men and women on the fabric of success – *APPerance*. Attendees will gain a deeper understanding of *you are addressed by the way you are dressed* and will gain practical fashion do's and don'ts. Workshop attendees will leave this session knowing – you can have anything you want if you dress for it.

Excelling in Agriculture for the Future: Considered a career in agriculture? Ever thought about what opportunities await you in Cooperative Extension? Wondering what steps to take in order to be successful in an agriculture related or Cooperative Extension job? Excelling in Agriculture for the Future is the workshop for you! This session will aim to cover a brief history of Cooperative Extension with a focus specifically on the land grant institutions in the state of Alabama, majors and minors to consider in order to gain internships and employment in agriculture and Cooperative Extension, outline the various positions in Cooperative Extension and their duties, and briefly address other paths to excelling in agriculture, environmental sciences, nutrition, and Cooperative Extension.

- The Value of Mentoring
- Building strong parental and community relationships
- Excelling in Agriculture for the Future

Preparing for the Future: There are a plethora of opportunities to take advantage of after successfully graduating from high school. How prepared are you for life after high school graduation? Considered a major? Applied to any college and/or universities yet? What is the image of your social profile? No worries, this workshop will go over vital information ever senior needs before high school graduation. The workshop will cover how to build your resume, steps to clean up your social profile, job/internship interview tips, and offer real world career preparedness and advice.

Why Join 4H?: 4-H is a youth led organization consisting of youth participants ages 5 to 21. 4-H thrives on the support of willing and trained volunteers. It is governed by the **National Institute of Food and Agriculture** of the **United States Department of Agriculture (USDA)**. 4-H has four main developmental areas: head, heart, hands, and health. The goal of 4-H is to develop citizenship, leadership, responsibility and life skills of youth through **experiential learning** programs and a **positive youth development** program implementation. 4-H today has broadened to focus on citizenship, healthy living, science, engineering, and technology programs. This workshop will aim to outline the benefits of getting involved in local 4H programs, clubs, and opportunities in your area.

KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



DARIUS JAMES

Darius James is a 22-year-old native of Tuskegee, Alabama and a 2010 graduate of Tuskegee's Booker T. Washington High School. He has one sibling, a younger brother name Steven Ellis James, Jr. who is 10 years younger than him. Darius prides himself on being a role model for his younger brother and other young people from his hometown. He is a senior at Morehouse College in Atlanta, GA where he is majoring in Biology. Darius is a poet, songwriter, and a musician. He enjoys reading, playing his acoustic guitar, and learning as much as he can about life so that he can make a difference in the lives of others.



YOLANDA E. THOMPSON

Armed with an enduring passion for God's calling upon her life in pastoral and social justice ministries, Rev. Yolanda Evette Thompson is an ordained bi-vocational pastoral leader who also has served as an Ethics and Public Relations professor in the Mass Media Arts division of Clark Atlanta University. She is an early retiree of AT&T and a former corporate public relations executive and speechwriter. She has also hosted radio and television public affairs programs for Atlanta-based media.

“Chaplain Yolanda” is dedicated to servant leadership and she has always worked in public service and ministry initiatives involving young people, education and their leadership development.

She is the former Director of Religious Services, Chaplaincy and Volunteer Services for the Georgia Department of Juvenile Justice - overseeing behavioral modification programming for more than 3,000 youth in long-term custody and more than 20,000 in community corrections. She also is the former Director of Public Affairs and Media Spokesperson for the Georgia Department of Corrections. In both of these statewide roles, she carried forth a mission to facilitate community reintegration initiatives that involved thousands of incarcerated youth, adults, and their families. She also coordinated a unique mentoring initiative with schools and juvenile courts statewide – taking incarcerated mentors into schools and churches to share candid reflections on prison life with youth at risk of incarceration. As a Clinical Chaplain and program development specialist, she has served as a program consultant for the Walton County (Georgia) Board of Education and the Walton County Juvenile Court – developing a comprehensive dropout intervention initiative for three high schools and two middle schools.

Chaplain Yolanda is a member of the Board of Directors of the Teen Summit Academy, which is based in Shelby, NC, which offers a year-round leadership development program for young people who are at risk of dropping out of school and life. Working with the Teen Summit Academy Founders, Gary and Pat Houston, and a team of celebrity partners including CeCe Winans and Tyler Perry, Chaplain Yolanda supports Pat Houston's vision through innovative monthly programs and also co-facilitates training seminars for Teen Summit students, which involve a number of corporate sponsors, including Cover Girl and Burberry.

BRENDA ALLEN

Brenda M. Allen is Extension Specialist for Urban Forestry with the Alabama Cooperative Extension System (ACES), and an Assistant Professor in Auburn University's School of Forestry & Wildlife Sciences. A native of Tuskegee, Alabama, she earned B.S. and M.S. degrees from Tuskegee Institute (now Tuskegee University), and a Ph.D. from Auburn University, specializing in Urban Forestry. She teaches courses in Environmental Ethics and Urban Forestry. Dr. Allen is affiliated with numerous professional associations and organizations, and serves as faculty advisor to Auburn University's MANRRS Chapter (Minorities in Ag, Natural Resources & Related Sciences). She is a member of the Alabama Urban Forestry Council, the Alabama Forestry Commission Outreach Advisory Council, the Society of Municipal Arborists' Internship Advisory Council, and Tuskegee

University's Forestry and Natural Resources Advisory Council. She has served on the National Science Foundation (NSF) Long Term Ecological Research (LTER) review team for the Baltimore Ecosystem Study, and was twice appointed by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture to serve two 3 year terms on the National Urban & Community Forestry Advisory Council (NUCFAC) representing Extension and academia. She also served two terms on the Executive Board of the National Association of Natural Resource and Extension Professionals as the Southern Regional Representative.



MICHELLE COLE

Michelle Cole is the Outreach Director for the Center for Forest Sustainability at Auburn University. She is also the co-advisor for MANRRS at Auburn University.
